

The Collect for the Sixth Sunday of Easter

God our redeemer, You have delivered us from the power of darkness And brought us into the kingdom of your Son: Grant, that as by his death he has recalled us to life, So by his continual presence in us he may raise us to eternal joy; Through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, Who is alive and reigns with you, In the unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, now and for ever. Amen

First Reading: Acts 17: 22-31

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription:



"To an unknown god."

What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you.

The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things.

From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said:

"For we too are his offspring."


Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals.

While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.'

Jesus said 'If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor



knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

'I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.'

The early citizens of Athens certainly didn't know; amongst many other idols they had even erected an altar to an unknown god, no doubt covering all bases just in case.

They were clearly "religious" but had failed to grasp the one true God. They needed the message that God doesn't live in shrines.

Now, of all days we're aware that we don't need to enter a building to find or worship God. Don't get me wrong, I'll be rejoicing along with everyone else when we can re-enter our buildings, joined together as a community of worshippers, but we are still the same community, albeit worshipping differently, knowing and sensing our Christian brothers and sisters as we read the weekly material.

Paul was reiterating that message of hope that Jesus left with his disciples, the promise of his Spirit ... "In him we live and move and have our being ... For we too are his offspring."

In the words which are attributed to St Teresa of Avila:-"Christ has no body but yours, No hands, no feet on earth but yours, Yours are the eyes with which he looks compassion on this world, Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good, Yours are the hands with which he blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes. You are his body. Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks compassion on this world. Christ has no body now on earth but yours." As we enter another week let us remember the one true God that Paul was proclaiming to the citizens of Athens and use our bodies and resources to be channels of hope and peace to others. Amen.
