The Readings

The First Reading: Isaiah 61: 1-4, 8-end

The spirit of the Lord GoD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour,

and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn;

to provide for those who mourn in Zion - to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

For I the LORD love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing;

I will faithfully give them their recompense,

and I will make an everlasting covenant with them.

Their descendants shall be known among the nations,

and their offspring among the peoples;

all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the LORD has blessed.

I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God;

for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation,

he has covered me with the robe of righteousness,

as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

The Second Reading: John 1:6-8, 19-28

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said,

'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord", as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

Reflection from Janice

I was driving along (without the radio on) when suddenly the Band Aid 1984 hit "Do they know it's Christmas?" popped into my head. You could say that isn't unusual given that we're now surrounded by Christmas music but I had also been seeking divine inspiration for this reflection!

You will probably recall that Band Aid was the brain child of Bob Geldof and raised millions of pounds for anti-famine efforts in Ethiopia. It was instrumental in bringing light and hope to the thousands of people caught up in that disaster.

Our Gospel reading today sets the scene for Christ's ministry here on earth. You could say that John the Baptist was the light that would lead people to Christ, light of the world, through love, not by force. John was under no illusion that he was in a position of power; the job of untying sandals was usually done by

slaves, people whose lives were not their own and were pretty much bottom of the pile. To say that he wasn't even worthy to do that job was truly radical. John's example is a powerful one for all Christians to follow and it's been said that he was preparing the way, not for God's people to return to the Promised Land, but for God to come to us.

Just like John prepared people for the coming of the Messiah, so we are to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ in our lives. We are called to witness to Christ by word and deed, in good times and bad and whether it suits us or not.

And we need to remind ourselves that we betray our Christian calling whenever we forget our servant role, whenever the institution becomes more important, whenever we cling to status and office, whenever we become just like everyone else in society and whenever we blend in. Instead, we need to remember John the Baptist, we need to be the light that points others to the real true light of Jesus himself, and to care for the less fortunate in society

When we have Christ in our lives we no longer have to be afraid but we have to recognise our need for him and confess our need of his grace and love. Only then will we truly experience him as the Lord and Saviour of our lives.

This year has seen challenges on a monumental scale not experienced by several generations but a light at the end of the tunnel is emerging. We will be lighting the third Advent candle this Sunday morning and at Denholme Shared Church we will be listening to a reflection reminding us that there is a Kingdom that will prevail long after this world's struggles have subsided, not because every evil has been conquered or overcome but because the mark of God's coming is indelibly stamped in the history and destiny of this world.

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of the Christ child in a couple of weeks let us prepare to reflect his light and hope to others, those who are both known and unknown.
