


# The Benefice of Harden, Wilsden, Cullingworth, Denholme Sunday 17 January 2021 The Second Sunday of Epiphany

### First Reading: 1 Samuel 3:1-10

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli. The word of the LORD was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was. Then the LORD called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' and he said, 'Here I am!' and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down. The LORD called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him. The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, 'Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening."' So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'

When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!' Nathanael asked him, 'Where did you come to know me?' Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.' Nathanael replied, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' Jesus answered, 'Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these.' And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

# Thanks be to God for the gift of His Word

### Reflection from Liz Moy

One of our local retreat houses reminds visitors that there is only very limited reception for mobile phones. In fact, to get the best reception, it is necessary to lean out of one of the upstairs windows at the front of the building. Of course, in some ways, it is perfect for a retreat because the distractions of frequent messages pinging in and calls coming through do not occur. If our minds are constantly tuned into an electronic device, are they able to hear other things which are going on around them?

In the Spring last year, numerous people mentioned a greater awareness of the sounds of nature - the birds singing, bees humming, animals in the fields, to name a few. It was easier to hear those sounds because they were not blotted out by the noise of traffic and machinery which is usually the backdrop to everyday life around us. They were able to tune in to a different type of sound and that, in turn, led many to a greater appreciation of the natural world and some to deeper reflection on the creator of such beauty.

The reading today illustrates how Samuel had to tune in to the sound of God speaking to him — and it didn't happen instantly. His master was in his room, trying to sleep, whilst Samuel was lying down in the temple. No doubt he was used to the sounds of the building, quite different from the hustle and busyness of the daytime, but no doubt, sounds which were distinctive to that place. Almost as if the building itself was settling down for the night. But then Samuel hears a voice calling him. Thinking that it is his master, he rushes through to him, only to be told to go back to bed because it was not his master calling. This happens once again. Though it was puzzling for Samuel and unsettling for Eli, yet again, Eli tells Samuel to go back to his bed. But the Lord calls Samuel again, and this time when Samuel rushes to Eli, his master realises what is happening. He is able to guide Samuel so that the next time he hears the voice, he can respond to the Lord by saying "Speak for your servant is listening". Samuel is able to tune in to the Lord, thanks to the help of Eli, and then his life took on a greater level of service for God.

God spoke to Samuel in a way that changed his life, but he used Eli to help Samuel recognise who was calling him and to prepare himself to respond to God. There is a reminder for us all in this passage that no matter what age a person is, they still have a role to play in the kingdom of God. Some older

people may feel that they have done their bit and that at their age, there is nothing more that they physically can do. But as God uses Eli, an old man whose eyesight is failing, to recognise his call on a younger person and to encourage that young boy to recognise God for himself, it is a reminder that we can all support others in their journey to and with God through words of encouragement and through our prayers. There is no age limit on that! Often, younger people feel that there is not a place for them – but God's kingdom is for all and our churches need to reflect that in our welcome and our joy in the growing faith of others, whatever age they may be and by encouraging all people to be people of faith in their words and actions.

The reading shows us that God spoke to Samuel in a voice which he identified as a voice. But at other times God may speak to us in other ways — maybe through the prompting of other people, through words of Scripture, through a beautiful view, an evocative piece of music or through a nudge of the Holy Spirit to our conscience. Our problem may be that if we are only listening for one thing (like the ping which tells us a text has arrived on the phone) then we may fail to recognise God speaking to us in other ways.

Take time to read the following poem, which can be a reminder of how God speaks to us.

## Not only in words

Why do you want me to speak?
Is not my presence sufficient for you?
The kiss of my love in the sunlight,
Or the scent of my being on a flower?

Why do you want me to speak,
When I hug you in the embrace of a friend?
When I move you by the fall of a song?
When I show you the scars on my hands?

Why do you ask me to speak, When I use other voices not mine? For mine is the cry of the stranger, The hungry, the prisoner, the poor. Why do you ask me to speak,
When I've spoken so often before?
Heed my world, read my Word
Seek my Son and then you will hear me.
