

The Second Reading: John 2:1-11

Hear the good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you, O Lord

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the

steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Reflection from Richard

It must have been quite a party!

It must have been quite some party, even before Jesus did his miracle of turning the water into wine.

Weddings, like the one in Cana, were big community celebrations and the feasting and drinking would have gone on and on! And in preparation for this, the family hosting the celebration would make sure that there was plenty to eat and lots to drink. It was very bad hospitality if there was not enough.

So for it to run out so soon means either very bad planning, or some very heavy drinking - it must have been quite a party!

We imagine that Jesus wasn't particularly well known at the time of the wedding, although the reading does tell us that he is there with his mother Mary and with his disciples.

When the wine runs out, it is Mary who gets Jesus involved. I've always wondered why the issue was such a worry to Mary. I can only think that the person hosting the party was someone she knew well and didn't want to see embarrassed.

Mary believes that Jesus can do something. She must have known already that he was able to deal with situations like this with authority and wisdom. She clearly knew from experience that he had very special abilities.

But Jesus did not wish to be involved and to do anything publicly. "My hour has not yet come." Mary doesn't argue, but tells the servants to do as Jesus says. She assumes he will still act.

And of course he does - but this miracle is really quite secret. Only the servants will know what happened. But it must have been a story they told many times over to everyone they knew.

And what a story they had to tell. The water jars each held between twenty or thirty gallons and they were filled to the brim. That means from the six jars up to 180 gallons which is 900 bottles of wine! And not just any wine, but fantastic and glorious wine ... the best!

John tells us in his gospel that this is the first of the signs that Jesus did to reveal who he was. He would indeed do many more miracles. His disciples would see him walk on water, feed great crowds and heal many people. Some of his miracles would bring him to the attention of people who really didn't appreciate his powers. Sometimes his miracles would be for the benefit of surprising people.

I wonder which of the miracles you particularly remember as you think of the story of Jesus. Which ones stand out for you? I wonder if you believe that they really took place or if you think they can be explained in rational ways or if you think they were done with sleight of hand like a magic trick.

For myself, I've always felt that the gospel writers were pretty convinced about how inexplicable they found the things they saw ... and they were there at the time!

And I sometimes think that in my prayers I am like Mary in this story. There are times when I speak to God asking him to show himself in a particular situation. Sometimes I realise that what I'm asking seems pretty impossible and I guess that I am asking for a miracle. And while there have been times that the answer has not come as I expected, there have also been times when the outcome has brought me amazement when something quite miraculous has happened.

Like this story, there has been no great proclamation or publicity. But each time a few have known, been amazed and rejoiced.

So when you talk with Jesus in your prayers, what do you believe about the things he can do? What have you asked and what have you seen? It doesn't need to be something you shout from the rooftops. But let the thrill of it give you joy and courage.

And if you've never believed, then maybe this is the day to give it a go!
